# A forced Landing in the Equatorial Rain Forest † Peter Wingent





The cover illustrated above was involved in a forced landing in the rain forest between Fort Archambault and Bangui, in French Equatorial Africa. (Illustration of the front is reduced to 67%; the back-stamps are full size).

It was posted in New York on  $14^{th}$  June 1938. The 45 cents postage = 5 cents first oz. ordinary foreign postage + 2 x 20 cents per ½ oz. air fee from London via Air Afrique/Sabena services. It was carried by the Compagnie Generale ship *Normandie* which "The Times" <sup>(1)</sup> records as sailed from New York on  $15^{th}$  June and berthed at Southampton on the  $20^{th}$ . The cover would have been sent to Paris, via London, by train and cross-Channel steamer and then flown to Algiers by the Air France service which departed Paris on the  $25^{th}$  June. From Algiers, the service was operated by Régie Air Afrique employing a Bloch 120 aircraft (F-ANNX). This aircraft left Fort Lamy to schedule on the  $29^{th}$  June and it is at this point that the story becomes dramatic.

The magazine "Icare" (2) provides a very long account of the episode. The following is a summary of the main events which paint a graphic picture of the hazards of flying

over the African jungle:

Having departed Fort Lamy on 29<sup>th</sup> June, F-ANNX was due to arrive at Bangui on the same day. Between Fort Archambault and Bangui the aircraft ran into a number of tornados and flew off course to avoid them. The strong headwinds and additional distance flown caused the aircraft to run short of fuel. After much searching for a clearing in the forest in which to land, one was found with only 20 minutes fuel left. Radio contact was made with Bangui and two military 'planes and another Bloch 120 began a search and the stranded aircraft was found. The clearing was full of termite hills, so spades and buckets were dropped and it took three days to level the ground before the rescue aircraft could land with fuel. The military aircraft took the six passengers and mail to Bangui to lighten the Bloch 120 so that it could take off. The crew of the Bloch 120 were George Descamps: pilot; Jean Barbier: radio operator and Carrey: engineer.

The aircraft took off again on 2<sup>nd</sup> July to arrive at Bangui the same day and then at Brazzaville on the 3<sup>rd</sup>. The cover was sent across the Congo River to Leopoldville on the same day and there it was back-stamped. The Leopoldville and Thysville back-stamps for 7<sup>th</sup> July and another Leopoldville one of 8<sup>th</sup> July indicate the cover was sent by train from Leopoldville to Thysville, despite not being re-addressed, and then returned. The pencilled note reads, "R 7/8/38 Leo on return from Angola." Clearly it was written by either Mr. or Mrs. Emory Ross, the month/day order being in American format.





A photograph taken from one of the rescue aircraft. The aircraft (F-ANNX) is arrowed.

Termite hills can be seen, being the darker spots covering the clearing.

A fire is burning to give a plume of smoke to mark the position.

(The editor of the BCSC Bulletin has enlarged the area around the aircraft (left) in an effort to show it more clearly, but unfortunately it is still blurred, although an object similar in shape can be seen.)

# Censorship marks on Ruanda-Urundi Postal Pieces: 1939 - 45. Mail sent to the USA. (Part 1) Alan Morvay

This article is written to complement the articles written by Walter Deijnckens (BCSC Bulletin 176, page 18 and Bulletin 177 page 17). This part, my contribution, focuses solely on mail travelling from Ruanda-Urundi to the United States of America.

The first three of my covers are the only ones that I have that have been resealed with the Usumbura tape Type Ac. Letters having such tape are hard to find because it was in use for only a few months in 1940.







**Figure 1**. <u>Kitega, 27 (error ?) June 1940 to Cleveland, Ohio</u>. This letter has a Congo censor tape and two transit cancels on the reverse: Usumbura 26 June 1940 and Albertville 24 July 1940. (NB the tape has been applied over the Usumbura mark.)







**Figure 2.** <u>Usumbura, 19 July 1940 to Chicago, Illinois.</u> A Belgian Congo censor tape has been used to reseal the envelope and a manuscript "2" censor's mark (circled in red) applied. There is an Albertville transit mark, 7 August 1940, on the reverse.







**Figure 3.** <u>Usumbura, 9 July 1940 to Glendale, California.</u> The envelope was resealed with the Belgian Congo Type Ac censor tape and has three transit cancelations: Albertville, 7 August 1940; Kabalo, 8 August 1940; Leopoldville 17 August 1940. There is a manuscript instruction "Via Stanleyville to Leopoldville" next to the *par avion* etiquette. This has been cancelled with red crayon. Franking is correct for internal air carriage, if <5g. However, 9 days elapsed between Kabalo and Leopoldville, which suggests surface carriage.



**Figure 4.** <u>Usumbura, 28 June 1940 to Glendale, California.</u> The Belgian Congo censor tape has a handwritten "3" censor number (circled in red). (It seems that handwritten censor numbers were applied mainly at the beginning of the censorship period, before numbered handstamps arrived for use at Usumbura.) This letter transited though Leopoldville on 10 July 1940 and then Lisbon on 1 August 1940.

Note: Only CENSURE appears on the tape. It has been trimmed to 21-23 mm in width. It is the 40mm wide Aa tape on which the top of CONGO BELGE is 26 mm from the top edge of the tape. Was the lower part, a 17mm wide strip, cut away to avoid partly covering the details on the front (as seen on Fig. 8)?





Figure 5. <u>Usumbura, 1? May</u> 1941 to New York.

The censor tape (Type Aa) is tied to the envelope with a Leopoldville 1, 24 May 1941 postmark. The envelope carries a Type Baa CENSURE CONGO BELGE linear cachet. There is one transit mark, Leopoldville 27 May 1941.

The presence of just the lower part of a postmark (left of the stamp) and low franking (2.50fr.) suggests that a 10fr. stamp has been removed from the cover after delivery.



**Figure 6.** <u>Kigali, 20 January 1945 to Ketuchen, New Jersey</u>. Resealed with the type Aa censor tape. The Usumbura 22 January 1945 postmark does not tie the tape to the envelope and is considered to be a transit mark. There is a second transit mark, Elisabethville 29 January 1945, indicating a routing to Cape Town for surface mail.

Figure 7. Usumbura, 9 September 1940 to Syracuse, New York.



There are two transit marks on the reverse: Leopoldville 1, 12 September 1940 and Lisbon, 9 October 1940.The Type Baa linear handstamp, CENSURE CONGO

BELGE, (on the front) shows that it had been inspected by the Congolese authorities.



The next two covers were resealed with US censor tapes that have similar wordings - OPENED BY EXAMINER - but differing font size [5/16 inch (Figure 8) and 3/8 inch (Figure 9)]. They were posted before the Belgian Congo authorities introduced censorship of civil mail.



**Figure 8.** <u>Usumbura, 12 February 1940 to Glendale, California.</u> This envelope has the US censor tape, only. Because the tape covers part of the return address, the censor completed the words that had been hidden under the tape (in his own handwriting) to restore the return address, an unusual action for a censor to take!



**Figure 9.** <u>Usumbura, (registered) 17 February 1940 to Chicago, Illinois.</u> It was received in the New York Registry Division on the 6 May 1940 and delivered to Chicago where it was received in the Chicago Registry Division on 7 May 1940 and

on the same day released for delivery. It has a Chicago (Lincoln Park Sta.) Illinois registered postmark for the 7 May 1940.

Much of the mail from the Belgian Colony and mandated territories (Ruanda-Urundi) sent to the USA travelled on the Trans-Atlantic air routes. Some of this mail carried routing instructions, such as "Par Panamerican Clipper", though much did not.






Figure 10. <u>Usumbura</u>, 5 June 1943 to New York. This envelope carries a CENSURE CONGO BELGE linear handstamp (Type Baa) and has been resealed with a clear self-adhesive (Scotch Tape) US censor tape after inspection. There is a Leopoldville 8 June 1943 transit mark on the reverse. The letter entered the US at Miami, Fla. where an oval Miami Fla. Registry cachet was applied and then the Airmail Section postmark five days later, 30 June 1943. (Both are very faint, below the 20Fr stamp.) Presumably, the content was inspected during this period. The letter was forwarded by air to New York on the same day, evidenced by the New York Registry Division cachet with postmark.

The envelope carries the SABENA boxed AVION cachet with typed routing instructions "Par Panamerican Clipper". A handwritten registration number is an unusual feature.

# A favorite cover: How to have the correct postage! Charles Hénuzet

Most of the time, the centre of interest on a letter or item of postal stationary is to be found on the reverse side, and this example is evidence for this contention.

Postal stationary Stibbe N°5: In 1889 15c was the tariff for European countries.



It has been cancelled BOMA 12 Août 7-M 1889 (type 1.2 DMTY) and has a BANANA 16 Août 12-S 1889 (type 1.2 DMTY) transit mark.

In reality, the BOMA cancellation is not the first cancellation, but the second! Look by the red arrow and you can see a part of a cancellation. It is part of a cancellation, "CENTRE DE CONCENTRATION DE TRI DE MATADI".

The complete cancellation




The question is WHY?

Always, the postman was required to cancel the mail when he received it. Remember

that in August 1889, only two post-offices existed in the I.E.C, BANANA and BOMA, and two "Centre de concentration de tri", MATADI and LUKUNGU.

Simply, the answer is to be found on the reverse side:

The card was written at VIVI on the 3<sup>rd</sup> August 1889. However, its post-office had been closed since the 18<sup>th</sup> MAY 1886. The card was taken from Vivi, directly to MATADI, the first place to receive the mail.





The explanation for sending it is found on the left side:

The sender (J.C.Peter) needed a "letter balance" to apply the correct postage on his letters.



## Part 2. Walter Deijnckens

<u>To French Guinea.</u> (Afrique Occidentale Française = A.O.F.)

**Usumbura -6-12.44** To Kéniéran via Dabala and Kankan. Itinerary: censored in Leopoldville on 8/12/44, forwarded to Brazzaville 12/12/44 with censorship control, (Postal Commission A), to Conakry 18/12/44 and finally Nzerekore on 28/12/44. Tariff: letter 2.50 fr./20g (in accordance with APU conventions in 1942) + 2.50 fr./5g air tax = 10 fr./15g letter.



<u>To French Central Africa</u>. (Afrique Equatoriale Française)

Kigali -2-2.99 (to Bangui). Leopoldville-1: 15-2.99, Brazzaville: 17/2/44.

Censored by Postal Commission A, with resealing label "Afrique Française Libre" and circled A1 cachet.

It arrived at Oubangi-Charon in March 1944.

Tariff: 2.50 fr./20g. (APU rate for carriage in 1942)









## To Egypt.

Usumbura -7-8.42 to Cairo but redirected to Baltim via Malakan. Transit Stanleyville 20-8.42,

Censored in Cairo with cachets applied: Postal Censor and Censor Department 5. Resealed with label "Opened by (Egyptian) Censor" and registered label applied. Tariff: 3.50 fr./20g + 3.50 fr. registration = 7 fr. in total.



Usumbura 11-1.44 to Cairo, which might have been carried on a direct flight because there are no transit marks present.

Tariff: 3.50 fr./20g letter + 3.50 fr. registration + 3.50 fr. Acknowledgement of Receipt (AR) + 6.75 fr./5g air tax. The total franking is correct according to order N $^{\circ}$  484/PT of 1/1/42 = 17.25 fr. total.




## To India.

Usumbura 25-8.41 to Bombay 2 OCT 41.

Itinerary: To Dar-es-Salaam and passed by Censor N°9, then carried by ship to Bombay where it was inspected by Censor 20 who applied his triangular cachet on the resealing censorship label.

Tariff: 2.75 fr./20g. letter (Rate valid from 1/12/1940 to 31/12/1941.)





## To Ceylon (Sri Lanka)


Usumbura -3-3.44 to Diytalawa 7 AP. 44, carried by BOAC (British Overseas Airways Corporation) to Cairo. Censorship cachet M in a double circle was applied. Opened and inspected in Ceylon by Censor L/31 who resealed it with his label.

Tariff: 3.50 fr./20g. letter + 12.75 fr./5g air tax = 16.25 fr. total.
